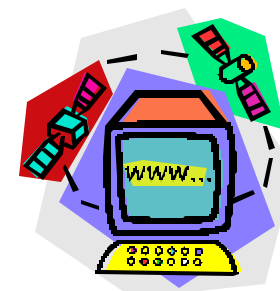

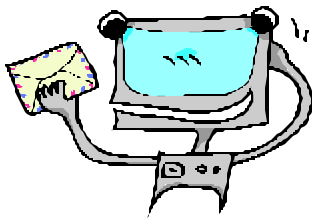

Technology into Teaching Mini-Grants

The Ohio Association of Private Colleges of Teacher Education (OAPCTE) has received in 2004 a \$50,000 grant from SBC. One of the main purposes of this grant is to develop a statewide venue for showcasing the use of technology by education students. This fall 2004 semester is the second round that is grant is being offered to Ohio's private colleges of teacher education.

Education professors are therefore encouraged to enlist their undergraduate and graduate education students for this competition!



Mini-Grant Proposal requirements:

1. All money is to go to teacher education students for "Technology Into Teaching Awards" except that up to \$50 may go to faculty judge(s) or coordinator(s) of the program.
2. Awards must be for projects developed and/or implemented in the fall 2004 semester.
3. The awards must be given in one or more of the following categories: No more than \$200 will be granted for any one category.
 - **Underclassman Technology projects.** These projects do not have to be directly related to teaching, but must use technology skills that could be used by the future teacher.
 - **Upperclassman Technology into Teaching projects.** These projects must be such that they could be used directly in a K-12 classroom.
 - **Graduate Student Technology into Teaching Projects.** These projects must be such that they could be used directly in a K-12 classroom.

Project Submission:

Money will be disbursed directly to institutions (not individual award winners) upon receipt by the contest coordinator **by December 15, 2004**, of:

1. A list of the names of the student awardees and electronic copies of their projects.
2. An electronic copy of the project requirements/materials given to students to promote the Technology into Teaching awards.
3. A copy of the rubric(s) used to judge the awards.



The awards are to be given in amounts and forms as the university determines. Awards do not need to be cash awards.

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
